FR DAVID'S GOSPEL REFLECTION: From the account of Jesus' birth, Luke moves the narrative abruptly forward to John and Jesus as adults. There was some ambivalence on the part of the evangelists concerning the precise relationship of Jesus and John to one another. Nowhere is this clearer than in the accounts of the baptism of Jesus. Mark's account is terse and seems straightforward. He states that Jesus was baptized by John in the Jordan. But on reflection we may well ask why Jesus needed to be baptized by John. John preached a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins and Jesus was without sin. How did the evangelists deal with this embarrassing episode? In Matthew's gospel when Jesus comes to be baptized, John tries to prevent him. He only agrees after Jesus indicates that he should proceed in order to carry out God's will. We see a similar hesitation in Luke. In a peculiar move (left out of today's gospel account), Luke describes John's arrest and imprisonment for criticizing Herod before his account of the baptism of Jesus, thus leaving unclear who exactly baptized Jesus. Leaving aside these later Christian interpretations, we know that Jesus' baptism was a decisive moment. The craftsman from a small Galilean village would never again be seen in Nazareth. From then on, he would devote his life to a prophetic task that would amaze his family and friends. Accepting John's baptism meant that he shared John's vision of the hopelessness of Israel's situation; the people must go through a radical conversion in order to receive God's forgiveness and prepare for the encounter with their God. Jesus accepted baptism as a sign and commitment to a radical change. He heard the voice of God calling him to a new mission.

PEACE SUNDAY is next Sunday 16 January. This year Pope Francis asks us to think about 'Education, work and dialogue between generations: tools for building lasting peace'. The need for peace in the world is obvious. People are struggling against violence and conflict, growing inequalities, the effects of climate change and the covid pandemic. How can we harness the gifts and energy of all generations in the work of peacemaking? Which 'tools for building lasting peace' do you think Pope Francis might be talking about? In this country we have an active Catholic peace movement in Pax Christi, which does a great deal of good work to promote peace and nonviolence through parishes, schools and social media. Their website suggests many ways we can all become better peacemakers. There are activities for families to do at home, including a peace liturgy for young children. https://paxchristi.org.uk/peace-sunday-2022 Pax Christi needs our support to keep going. 
